Welcome Bruce Stasyna, Conductor Widely-acclaimed conductor with the San Diego Opera & Washington Concert Opera to join the 2017 Festival.

We're delighted to announce the addition of Bruce Stasyna, conductor, to the 2017 festival staff. Bruce is looking forward to conducting our productions of Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi* and *Suor Angelica* in July. A "highly skilled conductor, choral technician, pianist, vocal coach and music administrator," Mr. Stasyna was recently awarded the position of Chorus Master at the San Diego Opera, while also serving as the Music Director for Vero Beach Opera. Mr. Stasyna was Head of Music for the Minnesota Opera, has conducted at New York City Opera, the Green Mountain Opera Festival, Des Moines Metro Opera, Lake George Opera

The Artist's Sketchbook: A Mixed Media Course with David Page Translate your experiences of Italy with an array of techniques as you develop your artistic focus

Join David Page, noted artist and sculptor, for this new offering in our visual arts program this year. Under David's tutelage, you will investigate the natural surroundings, architecture and artifacts of the Amalfi Coast. Discover how to observe and record your personal

experience via a series of drawings, direct rubbings, photographic imagery, and written accounts as you explore the area. Group discussions and visits to museums and artists' studios will complement class time in the field. A much sought-after teacher, David Page is currently Sculptor in Residence at American University and George Washington University. He has received the Maryland State Arts Council's Individual Artist Award on five different occasions, and was awarded the Trawick Prize as well as the University of Maryland's Art for Peace Award, which included the commission of a small sculptural object that was presented to Nelson Mandela upon his visit to the university. Experience Puccini at the Campano Amphitheater Look for opera singers instead of gladiators!

We are thrilled to announce that the cultural heritage office for the Region of Campania has invited us to perform our 2017 opera production in a stunning new venue, the Roman-era Campano Amphitheater. Built in the time of the emporer Augustus and restored by



Hadrian, the Campano Amphitheater is located outside the town of Capua, a short distance from the Palace of Caserta. It is second in size only to the Colosseum in Rome, which probably served as a model. The original exterior was formed by 80 Doric arcades in travertine, each four stories high, although only two arches remain; the keystones were once adorned with busts of divinities. The amphitheater was the seat of the first and world-renowned school of gladiators and holds a place in the collective imagination because it was there in 73 BC that the gladiator Spartacus launched the revolt

that held Rome in check for two years. Since 2014, the amphitheater has been under the management of the Department of Museums of the Region of Campania. The festival's performance will be a key feature in the monument's summer season!
